New Loan: Turnip The Beets Farm

Turnip The Beets Farm is run by Beverly and Shane Spanninger on their 8-acre property in Nelson County where they grow vegetables and flowers using ecologically sustainable practices. They started the farm in 2013, after Beverly had gained experience working on several farms during and after college. They sell their products at the Nelson County Farmers Market in Nellysford, the Lynchburg Community Market, and the Amherst Farmers Market. With their 0% SOIL loan from our Central Virginia fund they will purchase bulk amounts of ground cloth as a reusable weed barrier in order to help them better farm organically. The fabric will save them substantial

time weeding and reduce the environmental impact of using disposable plastic every year.

New Loan: Wild Rose Orchard

Wild Rose Orchard, run by Trevor and Jenna Piersol, is a perennial fruit farm using beyond organic practices. It's located near the town of Mount Sidney in Augusta County and was first established in November 2017. It is still under development as Trevor and Jenna continue planting fruit trees and berry bushes on their 12.5 acre property using the principles of permaculture design. They both have extensive backgrounds in farming, having met as fellows at the Allegheny Mountain Institute. With their 0% SOIL Loan from our Shenandoah Valley fund they are building a permanent 8-foot tall woven-wire deer fence around the farm's entire production area. In addition to the SOIL Loan, the project is being completed with the help of a grant they received through the Virginia Soil and Water Conservation District.
