In 2010 I co-founded Free Union Grass Farm, a diversified livestock farm in central Virginia producing pastured meat and eggs. The farm life was deeply meaningful and infinitely Instagram-able, but I kept wondering how I could be doing more to address the massive flaws in our food system.

So I left my farm in good hands to pursue my Masters in Environmental Management at Yale University, diving deep into food justice, climate change policy, soil science, and beyond. What kept ringing true for me is the essential role that regenerative land managers play in mitigating climate change, producing nutrient-dense food, and supporting vital local economies. It is ever clearer to me that without fixing our food system, there is no fixing climate change.

At FoodCap, supporting regenerative land managers is at the heart of our work, and it goes beyond just financial support. Yes, we're providing capital, but we're also providing business guidance, marketing insights, and steering farmers toward resources they might not know were available to them. In short, we're increasing not just operability in the short term, but viability and sustainability in the long run—and that's work I'm genuinely proud to be a part of.
