Vanguard Ranch

Owned by Renard and Chinette Turner, <u>Vanguard Ranch</u> is a diversified farm business located in Louisa County just to the southeast of Gordonsville. Since they started about 10 years ago, their product has mostly been pastured goat meat and heirloom vegetables. They now want to expand and diversity to better position their farm for the future. They will be able to do that with the help of their Slow Money loan which will go toward building a squabbery. Squab are meat pigeons, known for their delicate, succulent flesh, and their popularity in cuisines as distinct as Cantonese, Moroccan and French. Sharondale Farm

Located in the Cismont community in eastern Albemarle County, <u>Sharondale</u> <u>Farm</u> grows more than 20 varieties of certified organic gourmet and medicinal mushrooms. The farm was started in 2004 by Mark Jones on property that's been in his family for generations. Mark is a self-taught mycologist and now speaks widely on the subject of growing gourmet and medicinal mushrooms. With the help of his Slow Money Ioan he will be purchasing new equipment that will improve efficiency on his farm. The labor savings from the new equipment can be re-directed to growing and diversifying the business for the future. This includes expanding into value added food products, nutraceuticals, and supplements, as well as providing consultation services to other farmers looking to grow mushrooms as a value-added product and alternative revenue source.
